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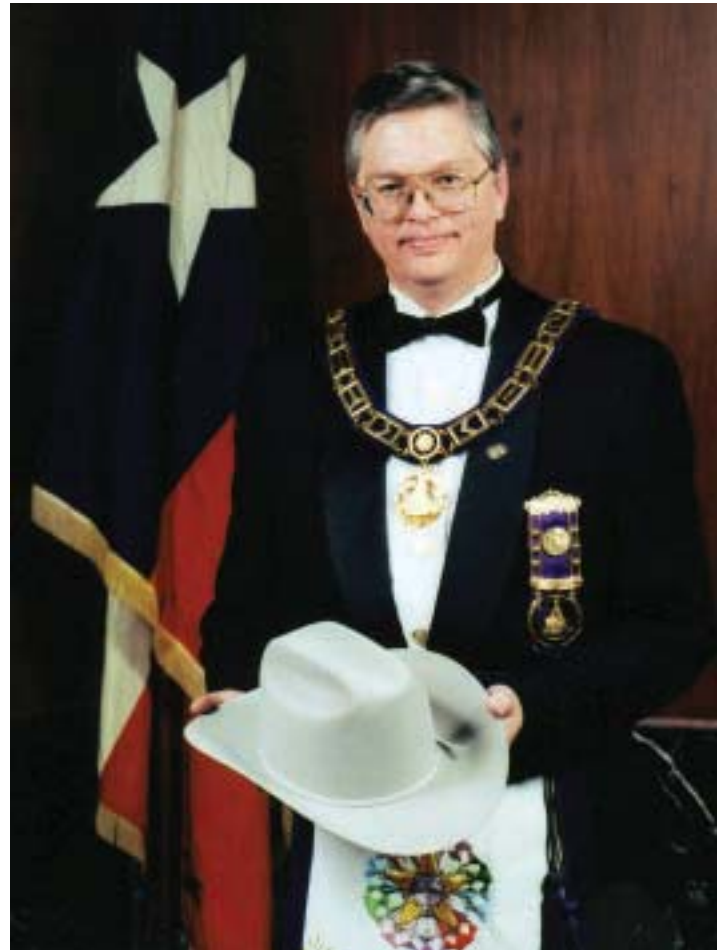
Michael D. Nanny, Grand Master of Masons in Texas

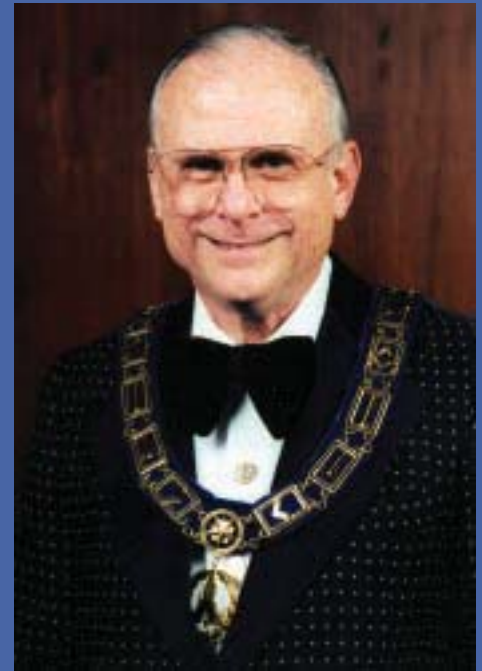

He has been active in

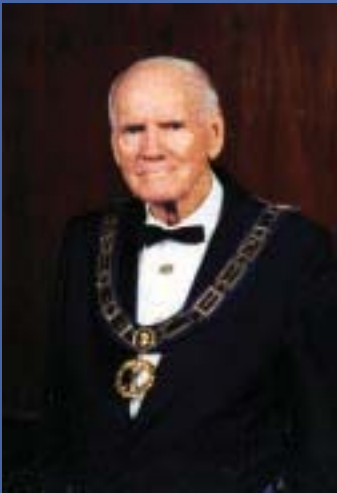

As an attorney at law, he is a partner with the Dallas firm of Strasburger & Price, L.L.P.



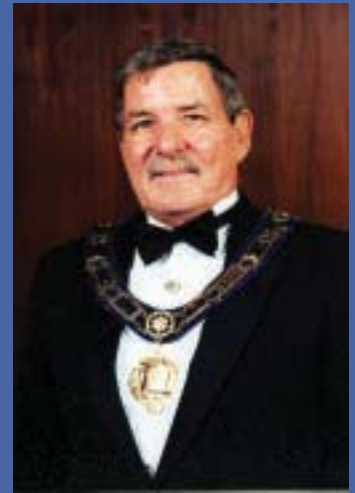

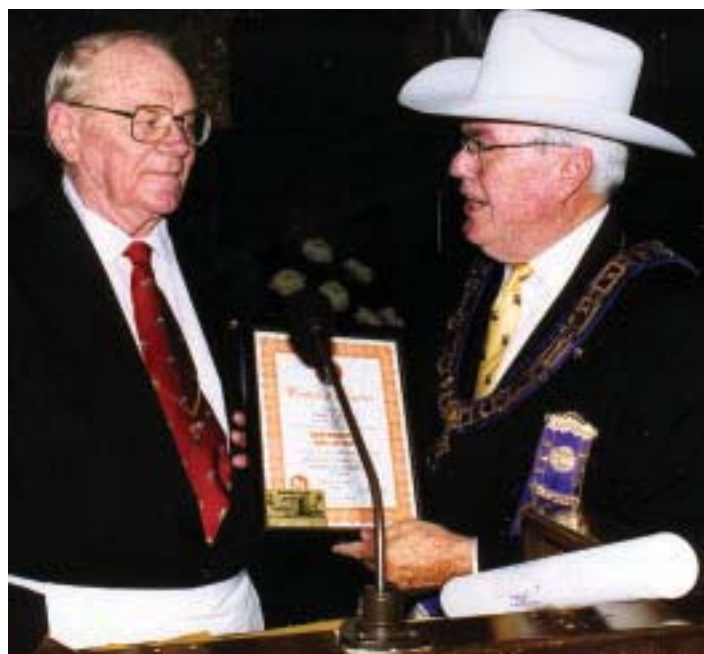

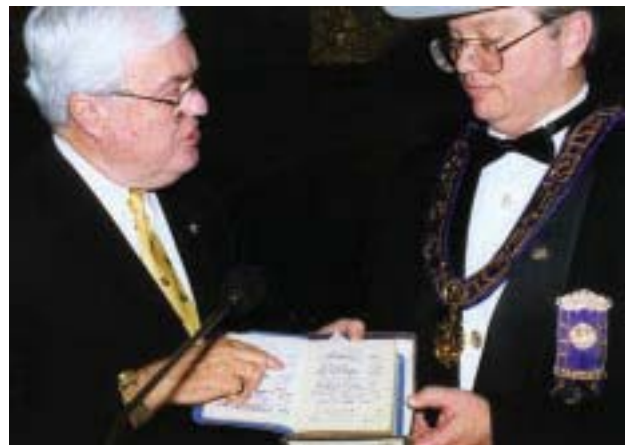

Dixon, Baptist Men receive Carrell Award

WACO — The W.B. and Brandon Carrell Humanitarian Award for 2001 was presented to Robert E. Dixon and the Texas Baptist Men during the 166th Annual Communication of the Masonic Grand Lodge of Texas Dec. 7 by Grand Master David B. Dibrell. The award, given in recognition of a non-Mason demonstrating Masonic principles, was presented for selfless acts of dedication in aiding those suffering from natural and manmade disasters.

In the wake of Hurricane Beulah in September 1967, Mr. Dixon set up a disaster relief center in Harlingen to serve storm victims on both sides of the border. The 1970 Lubbock tornado identified the need for a disaster mobile unit. Later that year, Hurricane Celia left widespread devastation in and around Corpus Christi. "This crisis helped our recipient develop his vision for relief and allowed him to obtain significant financial help from the Baptist State Missions and to enlist many volunteers," the Grand Master said.

The first disaster mobile unit was built in time to be used in the 1972 Guadalupe River flood in Seguin and New Braunfels and served 2,500 hot meals for flood victims and relief workers.

During 1973 and 1974, the unit became international and assisted in relief efforts in the aftermath of a major earthquake in Nicaragua. Their international work has continued. One

recent effort was the 1999 earthquake in Turkey, where Mr. Dixon and the Texas Baptist Men flew two airborne kitchens and two water purifiers from Dallas to the disaster site. They cooked and served

'Mr. Speaker' honored with Houston Medal

Former Congressman and Speaker of the United States House of Representatives James Wright of Fort Worth is the 2001 recipient of the Sam Houston Medal.

Known to all as *Jim*, and only slightly slowed by a stroke, he mounted the floor of Grand Lodge on the arm of his grandson to accept the award from Grand Master Dibrell.

Speaking from under a flag that flew over a military facility in Hawaii on Dec. 7, 1941, Bro. Wright, a decorated combat pilot in the South Pacific, responded with a heartfelt, patriotic message, which brought the audience to its feet.

After World War II, Bro. Wright returned to Weatherford, where he was elected to the Texas Legislature

at 23. He became the youngest mayor in Texas at 26 and was elected to Congress at 31. He served 10 years as Majority Leader before being sworn in as Speaker in 1989. He was a member of Congress for a to-

tal of 34 years and served with nine American presidents.

Bro. Wright began his Masonic career by receiving the Entered Apprentice Degree in 1944 at Phoenix Lodge No. 275 in Weatherford and his Master's by courtesy in Liberty Lodge, Lincoln, NE. A Scottish Rite Mason, first in the Valley of Dallas and then as a Charter Member in Fort Worth, he was Coroneted a 33rd Degree Inspector General Honorary in 1977. He is also a member of the York Rite Bodies, Shrine, Grotto,

Red Cross of Constantine, and is an Honorary Member of the International Supreme Council, Order of DeMolay. He also holds the DeMolay Legion of Honor.

Legislator receives Endowed Membership

AUSTIN — Texas State Senator Troy Fraser has been presented with an Endowed Membership in University Lodge No. 1190. Bro. Fraser, who has served in both the Texas House and later in the Senate from District 24, is a longtime business, civic and political leader.

“University Lodge No. 1190 in Austin is proud to bestow this honor on a distinguished Mason and lawmaker,” said lodge secretary Brad Bourland. “Our lodge is all the better in having this good Brother included in our membership.”

DEL RIO — Almost 40 years ago, the world teetered on the brink of war. During the infamous 13 days in October 1962, better known as the Cuban Missile Crisis, only one American life was lost to enemy fire. He was U-2 pilot Maj. Rudolph Anderson.

This past November, the Laughlan AFB Operations Training Complex was renamed “Anderson Hall” in a moving tribute to the pilot who was attached to the 4080th Strategic Wing.

Two of Maj. Anderson’s grown children participated in the ceremony, along with fellow U-2 pilot Brig. Gen. Gerald McIlmoyle, who spoke of the man he called his friend and mentor.

District Deputy Grand Master (43) James S. Long brought a message on behalf of the Grand Master honoring Bro. Anderson’s contribution to the highest ideals of Masonry. A member of Recovery Lodge No. 31 in Greenville, SC, Bro. Anderson became a Scottish Rite Mason in the Valley of San Antonio in 1961. On his death, the Cuban Masons-in-exile paid him their highest compliments and the San Antonio Valley named their 1963 Spring Reunion in his memory.

A wreath of evergreen — containing 11 white flowers to signify the 11 U-2 pilots who flew missions over Cuba and 13 red flowers to signify the 13 days of the crisis — was placed on behalf of the Masons of Texas to honor this heroic flier and Master Mason.

One Mason's generosity perpetuated

Grady V. Isbell was more than a statistic on the roll of over 4,000 Texas Master Masons who died last year. Soon after Bro. Isbell died on March 10, 2001, it was learned that he had named the Grand Lodge of Texas, together with other organizations and his church, as beneficiaries of his estate.

Upon settlement of the estate, the Grand Lodge received \$70,000. The Grand Lodge Trustees determined that the memory of Bro. Isbell could be better perpetuated and the money better utilized if it was placed in the Grand Lodge Endowment Fund, where only the earnings from the bequest would be used. This has been accomplished, and the generosity of Bro. Isbell will be remembered in perpetuity by a grateful fraternity.

Bro. Isbell was a member of Elkhart Lodge No. 400 in Elkhart, TX. He became a Mason in Kermit Lodge No. 1258 receiving his Master Mason's Degree on Nov. 21, 1932. He received his 65-year Service Award in 1998 and was an Endowed Member of Elkhart Lodge.

His actions in naming the Grand Lodge of Texas as a beneficiary of his estate should be an example for all loving, caring and concerned Masons to do likewise, thus assuring the financial stability of Freemasonry in Texas for future generations.

James A. Smith Lodge repeats certification honors

For the second time in Grand Lodge history, a lodge has scored the state's highest scores in all three certified degrees in a single year. James A. Smith Lodge No. 395 in Farmers Branch was honored during the 166th Grand Annual Communication as the only lodge to sweep the ritualistic triple crown.

The Committee on Work grades lodges seeking certification by awarding 1,000 points at the beginning of the degree, and the degree team loses points for improper candidate preparation, word errors, floor movements and delivery, in both sections of the

degree including the lecture, charge and apron presentation. The degree team needs a minimum of 900 points to be certified.

James A. Smith Lodge scored a 989 in the Entered Apprentice, 996 in the Fellowcraft and 992 in the Master Mason's Degree. This is also the first time a lodge has scored over 990 in the Master's.

In 1999, the lodge was the first to achieve the state's highest scores in all three degrees. In the last three years, the Committee on Work has awarded the lodge's degree teams the state's highest scores in eight out of nine graded degree presentations.

WWII Texas serviceman renews British lodge ties

In 1944, the Second World War was reaching a critical stage in Europe. England was a primary staging area and many young Americans awaited their time at the front, including one particular sailor from Central Texas: Mike Buchan.

While many American servicemen were alone in a country of strangers,

Mike had an entree ... he was a Master Mason.

A member of Harmony Lodge No. 6 and Lexington Lodge No. 138, he was in London on a five-day pass from his ship anchored off Omaha Beach. Wandering the bomb-shattered streets, he happened upon an impressive building with a huge bronze door, upon which was a symbol he well knew.

Fifty years later, in 1993, after writing an article for the *Scottish Rite Journal* on the anniversary of D-Day, Mike would again enter that door leading to New Century Lodge, this time at the lodge's special summons. As a guest of honor, he was given leave to come back, any time.

That chance came this past year on the centennial of the lodge, as Mike again returned to London to find that his previous visits had become part of a beautifully bound and illustrated history of the lodge.

Resolution 5 was withdrawn, and Resolutions 9 and 15 were not considered under the three-year rule.

Recommendations 1 and 2 both passed with amendment, while number 3 passed as submitted. Recommendation 4 was tabled.

As usual, the necessary revisions will be made to the laws and, when completed, your lodge will receive a copy.

Texian degree team due at San Jacinto

The Texian Master Mason's Degree Team sponsored by the Austin Scottish Rite Bodies has scheduled a first-ever degree conferral on the 166th anniversary of the Battle of San Jacinto on the monument grounds near Houston.

Texas Republic-era costumed ritualists, as featured in Issue #3 of the 2001 issue of *The Texas Mason*, have received special dispensation from the Grand Master to confer the degree on April 20, 2002, near the Masonic Monument on the site of Gen. Sam Houston's encampment.

Additional costumed Masons on foot and horseback will tile the meeting and fire a black-powder salute to honor the memory of those heroes who fought for Texas Independence in 1836.

175,000 meals in nine days and trained three groups of Turkish volunteers to take their place.

This year, after the Sept. 11 tragedy, they sent a team to New York City to provide hot meals for the rescue workers for several weeks.

"Each year, as natural disasters hit anywhere in the world, the Baptist Men, under Mr. Dixon's leadership, have answered the call," said Grand Master Dibrell. "They continue to share their Christian faith on foreign fields and have ministered to any who request their help. Just like Masons, these dedicated men help those in need, especially kids."

The W.B. and Brandon Carrell Humanitarian Award was established by the Masonic Grand Lodge of Texas to honor the father-and-son doctors whose pioneering efforts in the field of polio treatment at the Texas Scottish Rite Children's Hospital in Dallas are legendary.
